Insture Nature

Soak in nature—but stay dry—during a mindful walk through the woods.

De-stress and revitalize your soul with forest bathing, the Japanese practice of connecting with nature. It can be as simple as walking in forestland, which covers more than half the state.

2 Outdoor adventurers can check off multiple boxes with a trip to Porcupine Mountains Wilderness State Park, the state's largest, in Ontonagon. The park has more than 90 waterfalls and 90 miles of hiking trails, plus Lake of the Clouds, a mountain lake with astounding views surrounded by a forest.

3 The Saugatuck Dunes North Trail near Saugatuck is a bit of a trek (1.25 miles one way) through a pine forest and over soft sand, but hikers are rewarded with sparkling views of Lake Michigan. Climb the grassy dunes to reach the shoreline beach.

4 Near Rogers City, water tumbles over a series of rocks at Ocqueoc Falls, the largest publicly accessible waterfall in the Lower Peninsula.

Q FROM TOP WildWater Adventure, Muskegon:

Everyone will have a sopping good time at these water parks, splash pads and parks.

5 Giggles erupt from kids clambering on the jungle gym known as The Hydro Zone at **The Aqua Pit** in Coldwater.

6 Steady winds, shallow water and a buoyed swimming area along Lake Huron attract sun-lovers to Tawas Point State Park in East Tawas. Motor City Kite and Surf and Great Lakes Kiteboarding both offer lessons.

7 Spin through the Funnel of Fear and float the lazy river at Michigan's Adventure and WildWater Adventure, the state's largest outdoor water park in Muskegon.

8 Water cannons shower visitors at the Whirlpool Compass Fountain near the Silver Beach Carousel and Curious Kids' Discovery Zone in St. Joseph, all just steps from Lake Michigan.

9 Waterslides, a lazy river and a 300-gallon dumping bucket keep everyone cool at Turtle Cove Family Aquatic Center, part of the Lower Huron Metropark in Belleville.

Pick a watercraft and glide through the Great Lakes State.

10 Gather friends and family and cruise the Inland Waterway on a pontoon. The state's longest chain of lakes and rivers includes **Mullet** and **Burt lakes**. Rentals are available at **Indian River Marina**.

11 Paddle the Crystal River on a kayak from **Crystal River Outfitters** in Glen Arbor.

12 Tube, raft and kayak the Sturgeon River, the Lower Peninsula's fastest-moving river. Outfitters like Sturgeon River Paddlesports in Wolverine and Big Bear Adventures in Indian River rent equipment.

Q FROM TOP The Outdoor Activity Center at the Keweenaw Mountain Lodge, headquarters for the Keweenaw Dark Sky Park, Copper Harbor; Crystal River Outfitters, Glen Arbor



Go deep underground or stay out after dark.

13 About two hours after sunset and two hours before sunrise are the best times to stargaze in areas with zero to no light pollution, such as the **Keweenaw Dark Sky Park** at Keweenaw Mountain Lodge in Copper Harbor.

14 When the sun goes down, head to the Capri Drive-In theater for a double feature in Coldwater.

15 In Hancock, see where miners once drilled for copper ore. **Quincy Mine** tours include riding a tram down a steep hill and walking into the mine where it's always a brisk 43 degrees.





WATER SAFETY

Wearing a personal flotation device (life jacket) can keep you safe. In Michigan, all watercraft must have one for every person on board, and children under 6 must wear one.

16 Kayak the Boardman River through Traverse City with outfitters like **Paddle TC** and **Kayak**, **Bike and Brew**, a guided pedal and paddle tour.

17 A Lake Huron roadside stop fronts a secret beach. About 12 miles north of Port Sanilac, pull off at 4 Mile Scenic Turnout, follow the sidewalk and descend the stairs to a wide sandy beach with shade trees.

18 Ride the wave! In Empire, **Sleeping Bear Surf and Kayak** offers surflessons, where participants learn to surf on Lake Michigan. Wet suits are available to rent and are recommended.

19 The Saginaw River is the backdrop to Bay City's **Wednesdays in the Park.** Bands serenade crowds from 7 to 9 p.m. during this summer concert series.

20 Cool your mouth while tempting your taste buds with a scoop or two from the **MSU Dairy Store** in East Lansing. Go next door to the **Dairy Plant's** observation deck to see how ice cream is made.

FRUIT Salute

Michigan's lake-effect climate produces many of nature's most sweet treats in the form of tart cherries and juicy berries. Celebrate the state's summer fruits at a festival or pick your own.

BLUEBERRIES

Most store-bought blueberries are grown in South Haven, which has the largest concentration of blueberry farmers in the world. During July and August, visitors can pick their own at **DeGrandchamp Farms.** Since 1963, the National Blueberry Festival has honored the blue orb with a parade, free concerts and more (August 9–10).

THIMBLEBERRIES

Hidden along forested trails and hillsides, thimbleberries grow in the wild on the Keweenaw Peninsula. From mid-July to late August, foragers and hikers can search along the trails for the delicate berry, best eaten fresh or made into jam. Get a taste at **Jampot**, a specialty store and bakery run by Byzantine monks in Eagle Harbor.

TART CHERRIES

Traverse City earns the title Cherry Capital of the World—the region grows 75 percent of the nation's Montmorency cherries. Celebrate this superfruit during the National Cherry Festival (June 28–July 5). Pick your own at **Third Coast Fruit Company**, a seventhgeneration family farm, or pop into **Cherry Republic** with more than 200 cherryrelated products.

STRAWBERRIES

One of summer's first fruits, strawberries grow throughout the state. In early June, head to **Whittaker's Berry Farm** in Ida and fill your basket. Strawberry shortcake and a Strawberry Queen reign at the Copper Country Strawberry Festival in Chassell, along Portage Lake near the base of the Keweenaw Peninsula (July 11–12).

OUTDOORSY FUN IN THE MITTEN STATE

From A TO Z

From accessibility to ziplining, exploring the great outdoors in Michigan is as easy as ABC.

ACCESSIBLE RECREATION

People of all abilities can enjoy the state's parks and recreation areas via color blind scenic viewers, kayak launches (check out the letter K entry, *page 18*), and beach and track chairs at more than 25 state parks, including Holland, Bay City and Warren Dunes.

BOATING

Michigan has more than 3,330 miles of Great Lakes shoreline, 11,000 inland lakes, and tens of thousands of rivers and streams. With so many options, boaters can pick their preferred speed and launch their next aquatic adventure from more than 1,000 public boat launches and 82 public harbors.

CAMPGROUNDS

Overnight lodging locations include rustic, ready-made tiny houses and campgrounds exceeding 14,000 sites within 103 state parks and recreation areas. There are also 140 state forest campgrounds. Additional sites include RV parks and working farms like **Blooming Bus** Farms in Niles. DARK SKY PARKS

Gaze at the stars and catch the northern lights at **Headlands International Dark Sky Park** in Mackinaw City. Throughout the summer, an astronomer has a telescope set up on the viewing platform on clear nights. The park is one of three International Dark Sky Parks in the state.

EQUESTRIAN TRAILS

Saddle up and choose from more than 800 miles of trails, including 30 at **Ely Lake Campground** with horse-friendly campsites in Fennville. Shoreline riding begins November 1 at **Silver Lake State Park** in Mears. (Registration opens September 1.)

FISHING

Twice a year, the state offers **Free Fishing Weekends** (June 7-8 and February 2026). Native species include northern pike, walleye and whitefish, a staple on northern Michigan menus.

GLAMPING

Geodesic domes and yurts are just two unique lodging options you'll encounter. At **Sleeper State Park** in Caseville, overnight

in a mini cabin. Remember to bring marshmallows for s'mores.

HARTWICK PINES STATE PARK

Show your elders some respect at the 49-acre old-growth forest—some of the last remaining in the state—at this park in Grayling.

ISLANDS

Michigan has more than 400 named islands. The largest (and most remote), **Isle Royale National Park,** measures 50 miles long and 9 miles wide with more than 450 smaller, nearby islands in Lake Superior.

JUNIOR RANGER PROGRAM

Learn about the Great Lakes (four of five touch Michigan) and complete outdoor activities, such as identifying animal tracks, to earn a certificate through the National Park Service.

KAYAK LAUNCHES

These easy-to-use launches provide universal accessibility with a transfer bench and slide board for paddlers to sit, slide and drop into the vessel. A handful of state parks have them, including **Rifle River Recreation Area** in Lupton and Detroit's **Belle Isle**.

LIGHTHOUSES

Each of the state's 129 beacons are unique. Some squat (Old Presque Isle Lighthouse, Presque Isle), some tall (Big Sable Point Lighthouse, Ludington), some haunted (Seul Choix Pointe Lighthouse, Gulliver), some not. Overnight as a guest (Big Bay Point Lighthouse Bed and Breakfast, Big Bay) or a keeper (Tawas Point Lighthouse, East Tawas).

Plan a road trip to Lansing, Michigan and discover greater options like exciting attractions, lively festivals, diverse dining and charming communities. Choose Lansing for your next getaway and plan on something Greater.

MOUNTAIN BIKE TRAILS

The Keweenaw Peninsula has an extensive range of trails: cross-country, downhill, jump and flow. For singletrack, head to the Maasto Hiihto and Churning Rapids trail systems in Hancock. Copper Harbor's trails are recognized by IMBA as Silver-Level. Mountain bike rentals are available from Keweenaw Adventure Company in Copper Harbor.

NATURAL SPRING Take the self-propelled,

observation raft to the center of Kitch-iti-Kipi freshwater spring at **Palms Book State Park** in Manistique. Here, the crystal-clear water remains a constant 45 degrees and is home to large lake trout.

ORV RIDING

The state has more than 4,000 miles of statedesignated trails, plus scramble areas like **Holly Oaks ORV Park** in Holly and **Silver Lake** in Mears. In the UP's **Ontonagon County,** off-roaders can charge at four EV stations.

PICTURED ROCKS NATIONAL LAKESHORE

The name stems from the stained, sandstone cliffs (some as high as 200 feet above Lake Superior) that occupy 15 of the 42 miles of lakeshore between Munising and Grand Marais. Within the park, visitors can explore 100 miles of hiking trails, six lakes, a lighthouse and six waterfalls (plus two that are best seen from the water).

QUALITY TIME

Many state parks offer adult and child activities, such as bird- and wildlifewatching. And many state park nature centers provide dropin sessions and free classes on topics like making a bird feeder from a pinecone.

RECREATION PASSPORT

All vehicles entering state parks, forests, campgrounds, recreation areas and state-managed boating sites are required to have a recreation passport. Costs for non-Michigan registered vehicles: \$11 for a day pass and \$40 for an annual pass.

SAND DUNES

Shifting, changing sand dunes, rising 260-feet high, stretch for 3 miles at **Warren Dunes State Park** in Sawyer. These 10,000-year-old hills and ridges follow the Lake Michigan shoreline north to **Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore** in Glen Arbor.

TRAILS

The state's longest trail, the **Iron Belle Trail**, stretches from Detroit's Belle Isle to the western edge of the Upper Peninsula. Hike or bike parts of this or any of the other 13,400 statedesignated trails.

URBAN PARK

Swim in the lake, play on the beach and get soaked in the splash pad at **Millennium Park** in Walker. The boathouse rents kayaks, paddleboats, canoes and stand-up paddleboards.

VOLUNTEERISM

Join a volunteer stewardship workday and help protect the parks and natural areas—or get trained to do it on your own at one of the state's more than 100 state parks. These activities include bird surveys, invasive plant removal and insect monitoring.

WATERFALLS

Discover more than 300 waterfalls in the Upper Peninsula, including the state's largest at Tahquamenon Falls State Park in Paradise.

YOUTH HUNTING

Introduce children to the sport of hunting and fishing through the Michigan Department of Natural Resources Mentored Youth Hunting Program (9 and under) and apprentice hunting (10 and over) when accompanied by a licensed adult 21 and over.

ZIPLINE AND MORE

After gliding through the trees on a zipline, learn to luge, shoot a bow and arrow, and rock climb at **Muskegon Luge Adventure Sports Park** in Muskegon. The park also offers adaptive sports equipment.

SHIPWRECKS

Cool temperatures have preserved hundreds of unfortunate vessels at the bottom of Lake Huron. See for yourself what lies below the water's calm surface.

THUNDER BAY NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARY AND GREAT LAKES MARITIME HERITAGE CENTER Alpena

Swim alongside a sunken wooden schooner where vegetation reaches fingerlike from its bow, and two intact masts stretch up toward the water surface. This is the ship Defiance, a grain-carrying vessel that succumbed to Shipwreck Alley in 1854. It's one of nearly 100 sunken boats discovered at the bottom of Thunder Bay and protected in a 4,300-square-mile sanctuary off the coast of eastern Michigan. Between May and September, the sanctuary installs mooring buoys to help divers and snorkelers find the wrecks and see the boats up close. Visitors who prefer to stay dry can gaze down through the clear water from stand-up paddleboards or the Lady Michigan, a glass-bottom boat that pushes off from the **Great Lakes Maritime** Heritage Center.

The free center presents the seafaring history of the area, including a life-size boat deck that guests can explore and "underwater" tunnels they can crawl through.

DETOUR PASSAGE UNDERWATER PRESERVE

Drummond Island Shoreline loungers gaze at freighters gliding through DeTour Passage, a channel connecting Lake Huron to the locks of Sault Ste. Marie. The sturdy cargo carriers appear invincible, but broken ships lurking beneath the waves prove fog and storms can bring down such giants. Wiggle into a wet suit to swim among split masts and other battered boat parts. Not every wreck requires an oxygen tank to examine: Snorkelers can peek at the J.C. Ford, a 172-foot package steamer that exploded in 1924, scattering remains into water as shallow as 5 feet. Swing by **DeTour Passage Historical Museum** to learn about the history of the area and its lighthouses.

LIGHTHOUSES

The treacherous Great Lakes make lighthouses essential, and Michigan has more than any other state in the U.S. Get to know these standouts along the Sunrise Side.

PRESQUE ISLE LIGHTHOUSES

OLD AND NEW

Presque Isle Township Climbing 130 steps to the top of the New Presque Isle Lighthouse may not be the only contributor toward sweaty palms and a racing heart: Legends say a lighthouse keeper from the past haunts the nearby Old Presque Isle Lighthouse, located about a mile from its replacement.

TAWAS POINT LIGHTHOUSE East Tawas

On a clear day, scaling 85 steps to the top of the Tawas Point Lighthouse results in the sun bouncing off the surface of Tawas Bay and Lake Huron, casting dancing glimmers of light. A few feet below the water's surface, you may also spot the wreckage of the May Queen, a schooner that met its demise in 1859.

40 MILE POINT LIGHTHOUSE

north of Rogers City In 1905, the Joseph S. Fay smashed against the shore, close to the 52-foot-tall lighthouse operating there since 1897. The boat's wooden bones still lie in a slump on the beach, stretching 150 feet long and studded with metal rods. Nearby, spot your reflection in the less-battered Fresnel lens, the intricate cut-glass light used to signal ships.

FORT GRATIOT LIGHTHOUSE Port Huron

The clang of footsteps echoes throughout the 82-foot-tall tower as guests ascend its spiraling iron stairs during twice-hourly guided tours of Michigan's oldest lighthouse, built in 1829. Step onto the catwalk to feel a breeze sweeping in from Lake Huron and to spot the arches of the international Blue Water Bridge spanning the St. Clair River.

LORE

Lovers of all things yesteryear geek out at museums housed in historical structures.

HURON LIGHTSHIP MUSEUM AND THOMAS EDISON DEPOT MUSEUM Port Huron

A model of Thomas Edison's childhood chemistry lab and printing shop awaits inside a preserved baggage car at this accessible former depot, where the inventor worked as a newspaper reporter. Less than a mile away, tour the Huron Lightship, a floating museum with preserved crew quarters and a collection of model ships.

PROM TOP Les Cheneaux Islands; Thomas Edison Depot Museum, Port Huron; Turnip Rock, Port Austin

A SHOW OF HANDS

Michigan resembles a mitten thanks in part to Lake Huron, which shapes the Thumb. Ask **Michiganders where** they're from, and they'll use their right hand (palm up) as a map of the Lower Peninsula. The left hand (palm up) forms the Upper Peninsula when placed perpendicular to the right hand.

AND MORE

As you paddle or hike around Michigan's wild places, make sure to pause and admire some of Lake Huron's memorable moments.

TURNIP ROCK Port Austin

Top-heavy Turnip Rock cuts an eccentric figure against the blue water of the lake disappearing into the horizon. Rent a kayak from Port Austin Kayak and paddle to the water-bound landmark. Private land surrounds, so stay in your vessel for photo ops. Keep an eye out for the sea caves tucked away along the shoreline during your journey.

LES CHENEAUX ISLANDS

Cedarville and Hessel The lake grows tranquil as shore winds calm come evening, the setting sun transforming the glasslike surface into a colorful mosaic. Book a guided sunset paddle with outfitter Woods and Waters through the Les Cheneaux Islands, a collection of 36 land masses, to see the display up close.

HURON SUNRISE TRAIL Rogers City

The 11-mile span of this paved path delivers a variety of experiences interspersed with lakeside dunes. Watch **Carmeuse Lime and Stone** conveyor belts and crushers from afar near Harbor View, cast a line at the **Rogers City Marina** fishing platform and relax on the beach at **Hoeft State Park**.

DO Pick your mode of movement—bicycle, skates or running shoes—and head for the 10.5-mile paved TART Trail. Bayside stretches pass through West End Beach and Traverse City State Park. For a different pace, Crystal Spa presents a tantalizing menu of body and beauty services in a LEED-certified sanctuary at Crystal Mountain in Thompsonville.

EAT AND DRINK Farm Club expanded its idyllic 2-acre farm with 7-plus acres down the road to supply ingredients for its restaurant, brewery and market, as well as nearby Traverse City restaurants. Every detail counts in the 26-seat dining room at The Cooks' House that spotlights foraged and local delicacies. Nearby Chateau Grand Traverse and Brys Estate Vineyard and Winery help shape the Traverse Wine Coast, which capitalizes on the Old Mission Peninsula's microclimate for growing grapes.

STAY Tapas tours, wine dinners and sunset jazz events at winery and B&B **Chateau Chantal** embody farm-to-fork and all-inclusive ideals. At **The Mill Glen Arbor**, you can sleep in one of three rooms inside the reimagined site and savor fresh pastries made with grains milled in-house.

Mackinac Island

DO With private cars banned since 1898, this island was a century ahead of the alternative transit buzz. Besides walking, visitors rent bicycles, horse taxis and even buggies to drive or ride. Head to the bluffs of Mackinac Island State Park for views and the historic Fort Mackinac, preserving the state's oldest buildings. The Biddle House was a fur-trading outpost built in the 18th century, and is now home to a blacksmith shop and Native American cultural museum.

EAT AND DRINK Seared local walleye and vegan delicacies, such as wild mushroom tarts, shine on **Chianti's** farmto-ferry menu at **Mission Point Resort.** Vegetarians love devouring the curried chickpea wrap at **Watercolor Cafe** before listening to live music at **The Pink Pony** with an unbeatable patio on the water.

Bite into Michigan bacon, the B in the BLT on the **Petoskey Cheese** menu, west of downtown. At **Pier Restaurant**, dine on Great Lakes whitefish, greens and morel mushrooms while overlooking the water.

STAY The Highlands at Harbor Springs

is leading the charge toward sustainability with a net-zero-by-2030 pledge. The all-seasons family resort announced a ForeverProject initiative that will add electric vehicle chargers and updated chairlifts while focusing on clean energy technologies that will benefit guests and future generations.

TRIBAL Traditions

Bestselling author Angeline Boulley considers Sault Ste. Marie and Sugar Island more than backdrops for her novels. The area's storied heritage and contemporary issues enliven her YA thrillers.

Storytelling threads through Angeline Boulley's early experiences. Even before she could write, the author of *Firekeeper's Daughter* and *Warrior Girl Unearthed* spent summers listening to elders in her Ojibwe community pass oral traditions. Boulley's award-winning books weave Native American culture and history with modern tensions and the UP's natural wonders.

Sugar Island is Boulley's literary inspiration and ancestral homeland. "Every time I take the ferry across the St. Marys River, I get this sense of connectedness that I don't feel anywhere else," she says. Boulley spent decades tending the spark of her first novel. The region's scenic beauty and rich Indigenous and French influences dance on her pages, drawing readers in like the campfires of her childhood. Boulley's father serves as a traditional firekeeper, an important role that she explains is about more than striking a flame for spiritual activities. Firekeepers ensure everyone follows tribal protocols and provide cultural teachings. "I hear new stories and learn new things about my dad every time we sit at that fire."

NATIVE SPIRIT

Ziibiwing Center of Anishinabe Culture and Lifeways in Mt.Pleasant tops Boulley's must-visit list to learn about Indigenous heritage and history. In July, find dancing, drumming, singing and food at the Saginaw Chippewa Tribal National Powwow in Mt. Pleasant. Linger in the gift shop at St. Ignace's Museum of Ojibwa Culture, which features Native American art and handicrafts. At the corner of Jefferson Avenue and Dearborn Street in Detroit, a mural by artist Hadassah GreenSky signifies resurgence.

NATIONAL PARK Exit 15, Monroe

The drive for westward expansion and Indigenous groups collided in 1813, resulting in two bloody battles at the **River Raisin National Battlefield Park** in Monroe. Walk the sacred ground and orient yourself with a diorama at the visitors center, which also shows a 25-minute film, *The Untold Legacy of the River Raisin*.

CURIOUS COLLECTIONS Exit 41, Dearborn

Step aboard a 125-foot-long steam locomotive and see the cot George Washington slept on when on the field at the **Henry Ford Museum of American Innovation** in Dearborn. Next door, walk through **Greenfield Village,** a living-history museum with artisans, working farms and Thomas Edison's lab, where he perfected the light bulb.



CULTURAL CLASSICS Exit 53A, Detroit

Diego Rivera painted 27 massive panels in 1932, which cover the walls of the namesake court at the **Detroit Institute of Arts**. The *Detroit Industry Murals* captured Detroit's past status as a world-class industrial center, which was later devastated during the Great Depression. Across the street, the **Detroit Historical Museum** summarizes the city's history.

POLAR BEARS AND PENGUINS

Exit 61, Royal Oak More than 2,000 animals inhabit the **Detroit Zoo** in Royal Oak. One of the premier attractions, the Polk Penguin Conservation Center, houses more than 80 penguins and provides guests with a 4D experience (blasts of cold air and mist).

BARGAIN HUNTING

Exit 84B, Auburn Hills Name-brand retailers, such as Kate Spade and Michigan-only Primark, are just some of the 185-plus stores at Great Lakes Crossing Outlets, the state's largest indoor outlet center, in Auburn Hills. Farther north (Exit 136), **Birch Run Premium** Outlets boasts more than 100 stores. The savings continue at West Branch Outlet Shops (Exit 212) in West Branch.

GREAT EXPLORATIONS *Exit 111, Flint*

Fragrant gardens, magnificent large-scale Dale Chihuly artworks, balls bouncing on water and out-of-this-world shows are just a few of the highlights at the **Flint Cultural Center campus**, which includes a historic estate, an art museum, planetarium, and a science and history museum.

FAMILY FUN Exit 136, Frankenmuth Pack your swimsuit! The German town of Frankenmuth boasts two indoor water parks: Bavarian Inn Lodge's Bavarian Blast and Zehnder's Splash Village, the state's largest. Santa suits up at nearby Bronner's Christmas Wonderland, aka the World's Largest Christmas Store. Feast on all-you-can-eat chicken from Zehnder's of Frankenmuth and Bavarian Inn Restaurant.





NATURE TRAILS Exit 259, Grayling At Hartwick Pines State Park, visitors can hike 21 miles of trails and visit a chapel made of logs and a logging museum.

IN THE SWING

Exit 282, Gaylord Golfers looking to test their abilities take a swing in Gaylord at **Treetops** and **Otsego resorts.** Even if you don't get an eagle, you can score an elk sighting at **City Elk Park.**

TIME TRAVEL

Exit 339, Mackinaw City History comes alive at a reconstructed 18th-century fort and fur-trading village. Reenactors fire muskets and cannons at **Colonial Michilimackinac**, part of the Mackinac State Historic Parks in Mackinaw City. Next door, a guided tour of **1889 Old Mackinac Point Lighthouse** includes a climb to the top of the tower with views of the 5-mile-long Mackinac Bridge that leads to the Upper Peninsula.

TRIBES AND

TUNES Exit 344A, St. Ignace Learn about Native American culture at the Museum of Ojibwa Culture in St. Ignace. Open daily, the museum also includes a longhouse and sculpture park and stands beside the final resting place for Father Jacques Marquette, who founded the city. Local talent serenades crowds at the Music by the Bay series at the American Legion Park.







BRING THE KIDS Scan the code for more family-friendly trip ideas.

LOCK THROUGH Exit 394, Sault Ste. Marie Freighters up to 1,000 feet long navigate the Great Lakes via the Soo Locks in Sault Ste. Marie. Visitors can experience the locks firsthand from the Original Soo Locks and Famous Soo Locks boat tours. Bird's Eye Outfitters offers guided kayak trips through the locks. Other prime viewing spots include the Soo Locks Visitors Center and Tower of History.

FREEDOM Trail

Follow in the footsteps of freedom seekers and Underground Railroad conductors across Michigan.



reedom seekers often traversed a distinct path Ξ through Michigan. Many received a meal and medical attention from Pamela Brown Thomas and Nathan Thomas in Schoolcraft. Schedule a tour to see the Dr. Nathan Thomas House, complete with antique furniture. Next, conductors ferried passengers to the Battle Creek home of Sarah and Erastus Hussey, two Quakers. A bronze statue, Underground Railroad by Ed Dwight, depicts the duo and Harriet Tubman. In Brooklyn, early settler Royal Watkins thwarted the kidnapping of self-

emancipated John Felix White. Today, Watkins' land hosts a 5-mile walk through the flower-filled meadows of Watkins Lake State Park and County Preserve.

In Detroit, placards mark the sites of the FinneyBarn and George DeBaptiste House, where abolitionists protected escapees. In another bronze sculpture by Dwight, DeBaptiste leads eight freedom seekers. Short's Brewing founder

Joe Short loves cracking open a cold one after outdoor adventures in the Chain of Lakes region. The creator of the state's bestselling craft lager (Local's Light) is a visionary community catalyst, a superfan of the band Ween, and the someone who still helps take out the beer-garden trash.

Joe and his wife, Leah, first met as teens. The couple found their sweet spot growing "the biggest of the small breweries and the smallest of the big breweries" as a family enterprise. This means more than expanding the beer portfolio, which includes creative collaborations with Pure Michigan (IPAs) and Grammy-Award-winning musician Billy Strings (nonalcoholic Thirst Mutilator hop water). It's also about making Bellaire (population 1,000) a vibrant place to drink and an even better town to work and raise a family.

Q: Why was Bellaire the perfect place to start your brewery?

A: I wanted to be close to nature, specifically water. It turns out where I grew up was a pretty hard place to beat. I learned about this old hardware store for sale in Bellaire, and I thought the building was wellsuited to become a really cool pub. I envisioned living this life of going mountain biking and water-skiing when I wasn't making beer and having great discussions with people.

Q: You made all that happen, plus you have a band! Tell us about Braxton Hicks and The Contractions.

A: We have about eight songs. They're all about beer. There's usually a lot of storytelling and humor in between. We lean into the innuendo part of our shtick because eight songs don't last that long.

Q: What does the Short's Brewing mission to "leverage the power of smallness" mean?

A: The power of smallness is our ability to pivot and do things on a dime. We are capable of powerful projects and initiatives to help make the world a better place. As working owners, you can literally touch and feel every part of it.

Q: And some of Short's early projects have evolved into nonprofit organizations.

A: We started the Short's to Short's Paddle. It's a 27-mile route from the southern Chain of Lakes, which starts in Bellaire behind the brewpub and runs all the way to Elk Rapids, where our production facility is. It's a great way to take in northern Michigan and appreciate the pristine waters and charming communities. That event ended up evolving into a nonprofit called Paddle Antrim [which works to protect county waterways].

Q: Short's works with lots of interesting ingredients. Have you made any "happy accident" beers? **A:** I'm sure there's a ton. Soft Parade Shandy comes to mind. Soft Parade was a popular fruit ale. We were able to blend it with an excess supply

to blend it with an excess supply of lemonade we had on hand from another project, making it lighter and more crushable.

Lunch sandwich builder. My son frequently shares half of his "dad-made" sandwich with friends.

It's worth taking the long route on a road trip tour of Michigan's Sunset Coast. The West Michigan Pike historic byway hugs the waterfront of Lake Michigan from the state's southern border to the tip of the Mitt. Originally built in 1911, the drive is more appealing now than ever before. The all-American charm of the small coastal towns remains, along with sandy beaches, hiking trails and lighthouses. But get ready to discover enticing surprises. Local innovative art packs galleries in Saugatuck. Archeologists excavate at an 18th-century military fort and fur-trading settlement at Colonial Michilimackinac in Mackinaw City, and they are on hand to answer questions and show artifacts as weather allows. Time your road trip in spring for peak tulip and cherry seasons. In summer, roadside produce stands overflow with state-grown blueberries, cherries and peaches. Whatever the season, you'll be glad you spent some time taking the scenic route.

BEER CHURCH BREWING COMPANY New Buffalo Every day is Saturday at this brewery where they bake their own bread and serve breakfast until 2 p.m. in a former Civil War-era church.

KRASL ART CENTER St. Joseph Anchor your trip in the arts, exploring an outdoor sculpture garden and galleries packed with contemporary works and new artist projects.

WILD GINGER FLOWERS AND GIFTS St. Joseph

Shop for colorful stationery, fresh floral arrangements and jewelry made from beach glass, or take a wineand-painting class at this brick-walled hub for local female entrepreneurs.

FRIENDS GOOD WILL South Haven

The billowing sails and 80-foot-tall mast make this replica 1810 tall ship a floating landmark. Hop aboard a 90-minute sail narrated by crew members dressed in period clothes.

SAUGATUCK CENTER FOR THE ARTS Saugatuck

You'll find a mix of Broadway and original theater shows on stage; rotating exhibits in the gallery; and summer concerts, art installations and kaleidoscopic gardens outside.

RETRO BOAT RENTALS Saugatuck

Rent midcentury modern electric boats painted in candy colors at The Old Boat House waterfront bar and restaurant along the Kalamazoo River.

SPLISH SPLASH

Swim, hike the dunes and build castles in sugar-fine sand at one of Lake Michigan's best waterfronts. **Outdoor memories** await: Sandboard down 260-foot-tall dunes, rent a kayak or stand-up paddleboard, and wander 3 miles of sandy shore at Warren **Dunes State Park** in Sawyer. At the mouth of the St. Joseph River, Silver **Beach County Park** features a carousel, playground and fountain with multiple cannons shooting water into the air. Less than 5 miles from downtown Saugatuck, **Oval Beach** receives accolades for its pristine sand, dunes and a 1-mile trail to MountBaldhead. **Holland State Park** boasts expansive beaches, two track chairs and a view of Big Red, the iconic lighthouse. In Traverse City, Clinch

Park Beach offers kayak and paddleboard rentals across the street from downtown.

WHERE TO EAT AND DRINK

Modales Wine, Fennville Stroll the vineyards on this 76-acre farm, then sample some of the Rieslings, Sauvignon Blancs, rosés and Cabernet Francs made here. Virtue Cider, Fennville The Michiganapple ciders are for adults, but kids and dogs are welcome to meet the chickens and Gloucestershire Old Spots pigs on this solarpowered farm.

Coast 236 Restaurant and Bar, Saugatuck

Seafood is the star at this fine-dining staple, known for its deep wine list, six- and nine-course tasting menus, and romantic back patio.

Pennyroyal Cafe and Provisions, Saugatuck

Local seasonal dishes and daily fresh-made pastries draw crowds for brunch and dinner on a tree-lined, landscaped courtyard.

Day 2 SAUGATUCK TO LUDINGTON (115 MILES)

DEZWAAN WINDMILL Holland The only historic Dutch-built windmill in the U.S. (brought over from the Netherlands in 1964) still spins and grinds wheat. In spring, it's surrounded by 150,000 blooming tulips.

BOARDWALK Grand Haven

Follow the 2.5-mile promenade with shops and a restaurant to the end of the pier, where two lighthouses stand guard. At dusk, you'll find a free, half-hour water-and-lights show synchronized to beloved soundtracks (think Motown and ABBA) along the Grand River.

MUSKEGON LUGE ADVENTURE SPORTS PARK Muskegon

Head to Muskegon State Park and soar over the sand dunes on a quarter-mile zipline, ricochet downhill on a wheel-luge track, or climb a 38-foot-high rock wall.

SILVER LAKE STATE PARK Mears

Whip along the waterfront sand dunes on a sandboard or in your own ATV, dune buggy or UTV, or rent one (available by the hour) from Silver Lake Buggy Rentals. Mac Wood's Dune Rides provides guided rides.

STEARNS PARK BEACH Ludington

Watch the SS Badger's daily departures and arrivals from this sandy strip along the Lake Michigan shore, a short walk from downtown.

WHERE TO STAY

Lake Shore Resort, Saugatuck Greet the day with breakfast overlooking Lake Michigan, borrow a resort kayak or bike (downtown Saugatuck is 3 miles away), then watch the sunset around a firepit.

Wickwood Inn, Saugatuck Guests at this 11-room 1937 Colonial Revival inn can bookend their days with farm-to-table

LUDINGTON TO GLEN ARBOR (90 MILES)

REEL PLEASURE CHARTERS Manistee

For more than 40 years, Capt. Larry Scharich has been leading aspiring anglers on half- and full-day fishing trips for trout and salmon on Lake Michigan.

THE BIG "M" TRAIL Manistee

A canopy of hardwoods envelops the hilly 40-mile trail that loops near M-55 between Cadillac and Wellston. The year-round, nonmotorized trail welcomes pets.

SLEEPING BEAR DUNES NATIONAL LAKESHORE Empire

Seeing the largest freshwater sand dune system in the world (the bluffs loom 450 feet above Lake Michigan) yields bucket-list bragging rights and epic views.

ART'S TAVERN Glen Arbor

A local institution since 1934, Art's is beloved for its burgers, hundreds of college and sports pennants, and the two-headed stuffed fish that watches over it all.

KAYAK THE CRYSTAL RIVER Glen Arbor

Spot bald eagles, otters, white-tailed deer and blue herons on a twoto three-hour paddle along the clear waters of Crystal River in Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore.

Rent two wheels to cycle the paved Leelanau Trail through vineyards and woods with views of Lake Michigan. Pedal at your own pace or visit up to seven wineries on the Winery and Vineyard Bike Tour.

Day 5 TRAVERSE CITY TO MACKINAW CITY (103 MILES)

DARLING BOTANICAL COMPANY Traverse City

Stationery, books and gifts are sold alongside succulents and fresh-cut flowers. You can pick a few favorite plants and build your own terrarium.

NAUTI-CAT CRUISES Traverse City

Lounge in the nets and sunbathe, learn sailing fundamentals (jibbing, tacking, navigating), or toast the sunset with champagne on one of this catamaran's daily two-hour sails of West Grand Traverse Bay.

DOWNTOWN CHARLEVOIX

The tree-lined sidewalks of Charlevoix's walkable downtown are dotted with hanging baskets overflowing with blooms. Shop Harwood Gold's maple syrup and products, and vintage goods at True North Interior Design and Antiques.

PETOSKEY STATE PARK Petoskey

Hunt for the state's singular Petoskey and Charlevoix stones (both are kinds of coral; limit 25 pounds of stones per year) on the 1-mile, fossil-strewn stretch of beach between Harbor Springs and Petoskey.

MACKINAC STATE HISTORIC PARKS Mackinaw City

Historical interpreters are on hand to answer questions at Colonial Michilimackinac, a reconstructed 1700s fort and fur-trading village; the Historic Mill Creek sawmill; and the 1889 Old Mackinac Point Lighthouse.

After a drivers' meeting and introduction to your vehicle, you'll be burning through banked turns while a radio spotter gives pointers to boost your speed. Not ready to take the wheel? Hang on during a three-lap ride-along with a seasoned instructor.

... tend a lighthouse?

Home to 129 lighthouses, the most of any state, Michigan opens several of its coastal guardians to volunteer keepers during the summer. Most programs require at least a weeklong commitment, but longer and shorter shifts are possible. Assistant keepers at two active Lake Huron lighthouses—**Pointe aux Barques Maritime Museum** near Port Hope and offshore **DeTour Reef Light**, a short boat ride from DeTour Village—lead tours, care for the grounds and sleep in historic accommodations as waves lap just outside of the window.

... crank up a Model T?

The Ford Motor Company churned out more than 15 million "Tin Lizzies" between 1908 and 1927, and the decidedly old-school driving course at **Gilmore Car Museum** in Hickory Corners teaches time-traveling motorists how to operate these vintage vehicles. During the three-hour class, you'll share a Model T with an instructor and two other students, puttering along the winding roads of the historic campus. (Model T rides are also offered at **Greenfield Village** in Dearborn.)

... cast a fly on a river?

Whether you fish from a drift boat or in a pair of waders, the Au Sable River is home to some of the most storied wild trout fishing east of the Rockies. Guides at **North Branch Outing Club** and **Gates Au Sable Lodge**, both in Grayling, teach one-on-one beginner lessons and organize half- and full-day excursions from earliest spring through latest fall. Follow up your day on the water with a satisfying meal and epic fishing stories while relaxing on the porch at either of their rustic lodges.

... learn to sail?

You'll find your sea legs during a two-, four- or seven-day course taught by ASA-certified instructors at **Great Lakes Sailing Company** in Traverse City. Learn or master sailing basics, as well as cruising, docking, navigating and other skills, aboard 31- to 40-foot vessels, many of which also offer overnight accommodations. Classes run May through September.

... brew beer?

You can add brewmaster to your resume after a four-hour Brew On Premise experience hosted by **Saugatuck Brewing Company** in their main facility. Start a batch of IPA, summer wheat, porter or other style of beer, then return after fermentation (three to four weeks) to bottle your beverage. You can even design custom labels for your debut collection of at least sixty 22-ounce bottles.

... go on an artist's retreat?

For nearly a century, the peaceful pines and placid lakes at **Interlochen Center for the Arts** in Interlochen have inspired creativity for learners young and young at heart. Unplug on the 1,200-acre campus throughout the summer during facultyled retreats focused on acoustic guitar, choral singing, creative writing, plein-air painting and other artistic endeavors.

... shoot the rapids?

Outfitter **True North Outpost** in Norway knows where to find the UP's finest outdoor adventures, including Michigan's Class IV whitewater rafting trails. Follow your personal guide on a private Mini Expedition through the granite bluffs of Piers Gorge on the Menominee River. In addition to braving wild waters, you'll explore uninhabited islands, hike untrodden trails, try river-surfing and camp under a stunning night sky.

... reel in a big one?

Seasoned anglers share their expertise on half- and whole-day fishing charters that launch from docks all along the Michigan coast. Depending on the season and your piscatory interests, Capt. Steve Jones and his crew based out of Lexington will take you out on Lake Huron aboard the **Predator** for salmon or guide you around Lake St. Clair for walleye, bass or perch.



... work dough like a pro?

Go behind the scenes at Ann Arbor's beloved Bake! at **Zingerman's Bakehouse** and discover the delicious secrets of kneading dough and crimping pie crust. Four-hour, one-day and weekend classes, such as Ohh-la-la Croissants and Who You Calling a Cream Puff, set you up in their commercial kitchen with expert instructors, exclusive recipes and professional equipment. Individual and virtual classes are also available.

Have you ever wanted to ...



Even on a tight schedule, you'll find inspiration a'plenty at these drop-in experiences.

Artisans demonstrate glassblowing every Saturday and Sunday at Flint Institute of Arts, creating pieces from start to finish and sharing fascinating bits of science and history. At Gates Au Sable Lodge in Grayling, the staff is usually able to step outside to the banks of the Au Sable River and provide free fly-casting demos almost every day of the season. Whatever your ability, you can join mini workshops Wednesdays through Sundays at Detroit Institute of Arts; recent projects have included pet portraits, Pop Art jacket pins and puppets.

WATER YOU LOOKING FOR?

MARQUETTE GOLF CLUB MARQUETTE You might get a superiority complex after playing the two courses here both offer fantastic views of Lake Superior. The Heritage is more forgiving, with sprawling greens, few water hazards and a nearly century-old front nine. Greywalls, carved out of rugged UP wilderness, tests golfers with elevation changes and tough terrain.

ARCADIA BLUFFS ARCADIA

The Dozen, a 12-hole layout opening in 2025, joins two existing courses, The Bluffs (with stunning Lake Michigan vistas) and The South. Get a taste of links-style play on The Bluffs—it's open and undulating, with wide fairways and sodwall bunkers. The South Course incorporates bygone design features like rectangular tees, squared-off greens and ribbony sand traps.

LAKEVIEW HILLS COUNTRY CLUB AND RESORT LEXINGTON

With Lake Huron on the horizon, navigate two 18-hole courses connected by a tunnel. The South Course tests golfers' short games with subtle greens. The North Course features trees and ponds, plus views to drink in.

LAKEWOOD SHORES GOLF

RESORT OSCODA Complete a golf triple play near Lake Huron. The Gailes mimics Scotland's seaside links, including double greens, burns and long fescue grass. Blackshire is compact and classic. The Serradella is a walk in the park—wide fairways, few hazards, large greens and more than 50.000 flowers.

LAKE ERIE METROPARK GOLF COURSE BROWNSTOWN

It's water, water everywhere at this course set on a swath of land where the Detroit River flows into Lake Erie. Sue Nyquist's design brings water into view—and into play—on almost every hole, including the par-3 sixth, which requires a confident, accurate tee shot to keep your ball dry.

"FORE!" **IN THE** FOREST

FOREST DUNES GOLF CLUB ROSCOMMON

Swing from your heels to conquer Tom Weiskopf's Forest Dunes course, which changes its personality between the front nine and back nine. The Loop keeps you on your toes by playing in the opposite direction from the day before. The Bootlegger invites you to kick off your spikes for 10 holes of pitch-and-putt fun.

SHEPHERD'S HOLLOW GOLF **CLUB** CLARKSTON

To tweak an old saying, you can see the forest from the tees on this course,

which routes 27 holes through a heavily wooded property that could easily accommodate twice that many. The natural, minimalist design requires golfers to use a little imagination and play unusual shots from their bags of tricks and sticks.

BUCKS RUN GOLF CLUB

MT. PLEASANT Hunt for birdies amid artfully sculpted holes that skirt the Chippewa River, picturesque lakes and natural wetlands. You'll remember the par-3 eighth hole's beautiful views and two-tiered green nestled between Lake Fisher and a swath of woods. On the signature par-four 18th hole, the lake dares you to hit it over the water.

BLACK LAKE GOLF CLUB ONAWAY

Opened in 2000, the 18-hole layout consistently makes lists of top public courses in America. It's owned by the United Auto Workers and designed by master course whisperer Rees Jones, who let his creation flow with the natural terrain: "The holes were here, we just had to find them," Jones says.

THE WOODS

MACKINAC ISLAND It's the back nine of The Jewel, the 18-hole course at the legendary Grand Hotel. Because The Woods is more than a mile from the front nine, called The Grand. you ride a horse-drawn carriage to the 10th tee (no cars on Mackinac). Tree-lined fairways create a secluded feel, with views of Mackinac Bridge and the UP.

OPEN ENDEAVORS

SWEETGRASS AT ISLAND RESORT GOLF HARRIS

Recent course-of-theyear awards displayed in the pro shop validate Sweetgrass' stellar reputation. Expect parkland openness, striking greens (like the 15th's island design), and spectacular par 5s to finish the front and back nines. Owned by the Hannahville Indian Community, the course holes are named for Potawatomi clans, villages, allies, medicines and symbols.

AMERICAN DUNES

GRAND HAVEN Jack Nicklaus reinvented the property's existing course (the Grand Haven Golf Club), clearing trees to open up views and separating holes with expansive sand areas that resemble moonscapes. Opened in 2021, American Dunes commemorates the birthplace of the Folds of Honor. Yearly profits help support families of fallen and disabled service members.

THE CARDINAL AT ST. JOHN'S RESORT

PLYMOUTH New in 2024, it's metro Detroit's first public championship course in more than 20 years. Designer Raymond Hearn was inspired by layouts from a century ago (his design preserved trees just as old) and created an experience that blends challenging golf with the beauty of landscape architecture. One of the most memorable holes is the panoramic and picturesque par-4 sixth.

EAGLE EYE GOLF BATH

It doesn't get much more wide-open than the daunting island green of the par-three 17th hole at the Eagle Eye course. Five other layouts suit your golf appetite: Play Hawk Hollow's 27 holes, Timber Ridge's 18, Woodside's 12, or The Falcon's nine links-style holes. The Little Hawk course is just for putting.

GULL LAKE VIEW GOLF RESORT

AUGUSTA Binge-golf on six highly rated 18-hole courses. The 1960s-era East, West and Bedford Valley courses claim seniority, and the newer Stonehedge North and South courses offer drama. But it's the baby of the family, Stoatin Brae, that cries for attention. Raised up Simba-like by one of the county's highest points, the layout is expansive and windswept.





STAY AND PLAY

These resorts deliver more than thrilling rounds of golf. Check into ace accommodations and tap into the lodging's amenities, which could include a swimming pool, spa, zipline, restaurant, and rentals like a standup paddleboard and mountain bike.

BOYNE MOUNTAIN

BOYNE FALLS Invigorating vistas follow you like a caddie on The Alpine course, which starts at the mountain's summit and descends to Deer Lake. You'll spy plenty of furry and feathered friends too.

CRYSTAL MOUNTAIN

THOMPSONVILLE On the Mountain Ridge course, do a slow roll to the 16th tee—there's a scenic overlook along the cart path. Pause again at the 17th tee to marvel at seemingly endless trees.

GRAND TRAVERSE RESORT ACME

The Wolverine, designed by Gary Player, shows off northern Michigan's range of natural beauty. Wetlands dot the low-lying front nine, while highland hardwoods and views of East Grand Traverse Bay await on the back nine.

HARBOR SHORES GOLF COURSE

BENTON HARBOR The only Jack Nicklaus Signature course on Lake Michigan traverses four diverse terrains inland, dunes, woodlands and river. Turn around for a view of the lake before teeing off on the par-5 ninth hole.

THE HIGHLANDS AT HARBOR SPRINGS

HARBOR SPRINGS Doon Brae, a new ninehole, par-3 course by Michigan-based designer Ray Hearn, promises fun for all skill levels. Hearn is also helping revamp the Donald Ross Memorial course to better replicate Ross' signature holes.

THE HOMESTEAD GLEN ARBOR

Arnold Palmer considered the eighth hole at Manitou Passage one of his best par-5 designs ever. Like the rest of the front nine, it wanders a scenic route framed by fescue grasses, hardwoods and pines.

INN AT BAY HARBOR BAY HARBOR

The Links, one of three 9-hole courses, conjures up seaside courses on Ireland's Atlantic coastline. The layout hugs Lake Michigan, its magnificent water views framed by towering bluffs.

SHANTY CREEK

RESORT BELLAIRE Of the five courses, it's The Legend, designed by Arnold Palmer, that presents a great challenge, which can be more difficult for less experienced golfers. But the Cedar River course tends to appeal to a broader range of players and elicits the most *oohs* and *aahs*, thanks to its breathtaking landscape.

TREETOPS RESORT GAYLORD

This five-part symphony of courses reaches a crescendo with Masterpiece, designer Robert Trent Jones Sr.'s magnum opus. The songbird's-eye view from the tee of the par-3 sixth hole gave the resort its name.

TULLYMORE GOLF RESORT STANWOOD

In designing the St. Ives course, Jerry Matthews finished what a glacier started, carving holes out of woodlands, wetlands and rugged highlands. On the third tee, look back and feast your eyes.

David Zinn, a professional sidewalk chalk artist, uses existing cracks, rocks, weeds and even sewer covers to create 3D art in and around Ann Arbor. The compulsive doodler has a cast of characters he draws, like Sluggo (above); Philomena, a flying pig; and Nadine, a mouse. Chalk creations can last a few hours, days or weeks depending on the weather. Zinn has several permanent installations, including Story Time inside the Ann Arbor District Library (Youth Section). He's also hidden a dozen animals within the University of Michigan Museum of Natural History.
